Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Expenditure

Recognition of Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis. Expenditure includes any VAT which

expenditure cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it

relates.

Expenditure on These comprise the costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and

Grants payable All grant expenditure is accounted for on an actual paid basis plus an accrual for

grants that have been approved by the trustees at the end of the year but not yet

paid.

Governance costs These include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory

requirements of the Charity, including any audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity, together with a share of

other administration costs.

Other expenditure These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Freehold investment property

Investment properties are measured initially at cost and subsequently at fair value at each balance sheet date and are not depreciated. All gains or losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise.

Intangible fixed assets and amortisation

Intangible fixed assets (including purchased goodwill, patents and trademarks) are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses.

Stocks

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Donated items of stock are recognised at fair value which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the items on the open market.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities. In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for nay trade discounts due.

Research and development

Expenditure on research and development is written off in the year in which it is incurred.

Foreign currencies

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in currencies other than the functional currency of the charity are translated at the rates of exchange prevailing at the end of the reporting period. Transactions in currencies other than the functional currency of the charity are recorded at the rate of exchange on the date that the transaction occurred.

All exchange differences are are taken into account in arriving at net income/expenditure.

Leased assets

Where the charity enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a finance lease.

Leases which do not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to charity are classified as operating leases.

Assets held under finance leases are initially recognised as assets of the charity at their fair value at the inception of the lease or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the balance sheet date as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are apportioned between finance expenses and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance expenses are recognised immediately, unless they are directly attributable to qualifying assets, in which case they are capitalised in accordance with the charity's policy on borrowing costs.

Assets held under finance leases are depreciated in the same way as owned assets.

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term. In the event that lease incentives are received to enter into operating leases, such incentives are recognised as a liability. The aggregate benefit of incentives is recognised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis.

Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payments obligations. The contributions are recognised as expenses when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals in the balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the company in independently administered funds.

The Company is a charitable company limited by guarantee incorporated on 07/08/2012 and registered as a charity on 14/08/2012.

The company was established under a memorandum of association, which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

The Directors of NEoN (North East of North) Ltd are also charity trustees for the purpose if charity law and under the company's articles are know as members of the management committee.

NEoN, organises exhibitions, workshops, talks, conferences, live performances and public discussions and established itself as a platform to showcase national and international digital art forms. It was developed to raise the awareness of local and national digital arts from across Scotland and to showcase it along international work. Through digital arts it plays an important part in wider regional strategies that encourage cultural and economic growth. NEoN is looking to develop into a sustainable business model and through arts that will generate future investment, business and visitors to Dundee and its surrounding areas.

Delivered Activities

Climate Change Collage and GIF making, 19/10/19, Dundee Science Centre part of the science festival

This workshop was inspired by the 8bit imagery from This Burnt Earth Exhibition Dundee Science Centre hosted for NEoN festival. The workshop was split into two stations- the first had laptop computers for GIF making and the second paper and glue and craft materials for collage making.

NEoN Digital Arts Festival, 4-10 November 2019, Across Dundee 35 various activities, exhibitions, workshops etc were delivered as part of the festival. THEME 2019: REACT

NEoN Digital Arts Festival's theme this year, 'REACT', will bring together emerging and established digital artists, activists and community groups. A tide of change is sweeping across the globe — from immigration to the rise in nationalism — socio-political landscapes are increasingly subject to crisis. Unparalleled events such as Brexit, the #MeToo movement and the Yellow Vest Protests in Paris have elicited an unprecedented response as activists and community groups mobilise. Digital and media art has, from its inception, had close ties to political and social activism.

Genetic Automata and Sensor, 1 - 17 November 2019, GENERATORprojects

Two coinciding exhibitions: *Genetic Automata* by Larry Achiampong and David Blandy formed the first part of an ambitious new body of works by the artists, exploring race and identity in an age of avatars, video games, and DNA Ancestry testing. Initially commissioned by Arts Catalyst, this exhibition was shown during NEoN Festival as part of a national tour. *Sensor* by emerging artist Toby Jackson was an extension of work that he has been developing over the past few years, highlighting the relationships between humans and computers; lived experience, and its digital manipulation.

GET UP: a further reaction (to Genetic Automata and Sensor), 14/11/19, GENERATOR projects

Extending the theme of React, GET UP showcased a selection of invited artists who displayed/performed works in reaction to the themes and aesthetics of Genetic Automata and/or Sensor. In keeping with the themes explored in the exhibitions, we invited exclusively PoC artists to take part

in this event, proudly exhibiting our validity in a culture which often silences our narratives.

Steve Lambert Talk at Hot Chocolate/ Hot Chocolate Trust Takeover event, 6th November/ 8th November 2019, Wellgate Centre L1/ Steeple Church

Takeover- The takeover event allowed the Hot Chocolate Trust young people to use the tools and facilities of the NEoN activity room to explore issues relevant to them. The group got really hands on and made lots of badges and vinyl stickers. The day offered the opportunity to experiment with different media, such as the vinyl sticker maker, make mistakes and to have fun! Tea, Coffee and other refreshments were offered to the group and they really got at home with all of the different stations.

Re_Make/Re:Sist, 4- 13 November 2019, Wellgate Centre, Dundee

This exhibition, curated by Weave at Abertay, brings together emerging and established digital artists/activists whose work comments, reflects and challenges ideas relating to socio-political issues and events. It is a survey of media objects of protest against hostile acts and environments over the past 35 years.

Actions and Street Talks for expanded symposium, 3rd-8th November 2019, across Dundee city

The actions were part of the R@ct: Social Change Art Technology symposium. These were a series of performances, artworks and installations that all related to the theme of the symposium and discussed these themes through actions rather than the traditional talk format.

Activity Room, 4th-10th November 2019, Wellgate Centre

The activity room had four activity stations- vinyl cutter, badge maker, zine making and GIF Making and also included a library area, festival information, NEoN merchandise and two artworks- Mantra Marx and Leviathan: Reanimating Rubbish. The activity room also hosted some of the festival activities such as 'takeover' events by Dundee Women's business Station, DJCAD student Stella Roony and the Hot Chocolate trust, as well as the Art Jam workshop and acted as a base for festival information.

Poster Exhibition Take (to) the Streets, 4-10th November 2019, Street advertising spaces across Dundee

The street is a site of protest, hope and democracy. NEoN has invited three local emerging artists to reclaim the streets with posters which address this year's theme: React. Their work will be exhibited around the city for the duration of the festival. Remember, the street belongs to us all! The posters were designed by Caitlin Smith, Calumn Stevenson and Amy Parent. We partnered with advertising company Street Advertising to print and distribute the posters at various locations throughout the city of Dundee.

Change: Debate, 10/11/19, Wellgate Centre

A day of workshops and talks addressing the work that must be done by us, together with Dundee's many creative institutions to champion, support and nourish the work of artists of colour.

Re@ct: Social Change Art Technology Symposium

Nov - 6th - V&A Dundee

Nov - 7th - Dundee West Church & Chambers East, Dundee

Nov - 8th - Stepps Theatre, The Wellgate Center, Dundee

The two video works by Valentina Bonizzi exhibited at Nomas* Project show the results and the failures following the persistent attempts of the artist in trying to preserve a story, being that of a small bird or family album's photographs.

The (Not) Listening Project, Oct - Nov, 2019, Online

The (Not) Listening Project seeks people who have not had the opportunity to say something that is important to them. The limited podcast run draws on the NEoN's theme REACT to seek out what is being missed, what someone has always wanted to say but rarely found the opportunity - from the relational to the political.

Volunteer Programme

This year the volunteer programme had 17 committed people who assisted in the delivery of this years festival. There were 4 team members that volunteered for the second time; 6 that have received Saltire awards; and 5 who NEoN have recognised as being exceptional. Volunteer opportunities included Social Media, Installation, Invigilating, Events facilitation, workshops and outreach support, where possible we matched the volunteers interest to events or activities as related as possible happening during the festival. This meant that volunteers could have relevant experience for them.

Young mums outreach project - ongoing across Dundee

NEoN is currently developing a creative skills project aimed at young mothers living in Dundee. We are developing this project as we have identified that women aged under 20 and living in the most deprived areas had pregnancy rates five times higher than those in the least deprived (62.1 compared to 11.6 per 1,000 women) and women living in poverty are five times more likely to get pregnant.

The project is currently in the development stage with three young parent groups in Dundee- Baldragon academy young mothers provision,

Community and Learning Development (council social work department) and Bringing Up Baby group organised by Front Lounge charity. Activities are establishing a relationship with the community and building trust which is essential for the project to succeed. The aims of the project are:

- To allow young mothers to explore digital technology.
- To inspire young mothers to use digital technology creatively.
- For young mothers to develop creative digital skills.
